

Tourist spots

1 Usuki Tourism and Community Plaza (C-2)



Usuki's general tourist information center. Offers well-equipped facilities and a comfortable rest area as a starting point for strolling around the town and sightseeing. Bicycle rentals are also available, so please stop by first.

2 National Historic Site Usuki Castle Ruins (D-2)



During the Sengoku period, the Christian daimyo Sorin Otomo, who ruled six provinces in Kyushu, built a castle (Usuki Castle) around 1556, on Niujima, a naturally fortified island surrounded by the sea on three sides. In spring, it's one of the top cherry blossom spots in the prefecture.

3 National Registered Tangible Cultural Property Former Lower Residence of Inaba Clan (B-2)



It was built in 1902 (Meiji 35) as a residence for the Inaba clan, the former lords of the domain who had relocated to Tokyo following the abolition of the feudal domains and the establishment of prefectures. The building retains strong characteristics of late Edo upper class samurai residences, including a formal entrance (shikidai genkan) and shoin style architecture.

4 Nogami Yaeko Literary Memorial Museum (B-2)



This is the birthplace of Nogami Yaeko, who continued writing until the age of 99. Approximately 200 items, including her handwritten manuscripts and personal belongings, are on display.

5 Kuge-no-Okura (Old Sake Storehouse) (B-2)



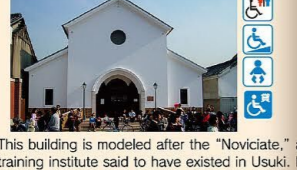
This former sake storehouse, originally used in the late Edo period by Kuge Honten, a sake brewery, has been renovated and now serves as a gallery for concerts and exhibitions. The walls are adorned with azulejos, traditional decorative tiles from Portugal.

6 Haccho Oji (Chuo-dori Shopping Street) (B-3)



Historic shopping street dating back to the Edo period.

7 Sala-de-Usuki (C-3)



This building is modeled after the "Noviciate," a training institute said to have existed in Usuki. It includes a cafe where visitors can enjoy local Usuki cuisine. Please feel free to stop by for a break.

8 Nioza Historical Road (C-3)



Nioza is a tuff hill formed from solidified volcanic ash from Mt. Aso, where paths were carved by cutting through the rock in various places. With its stone-paved streets lined with samurai residences and temples, the area retains the distinctive atmosphere of a castle town.

9 Former Shinkoji Temple (B-3)



The former temple has been renovated and opened to the public as a free rest area for town walkers and as a community gallery. From the second floor, visitors can enjoy a panoramic view of the Nioza Historical Road.

10 Prefecturally Designated Tangible Cultural Property Three-story Pagoda (Ryugenji Temple) (B-3)



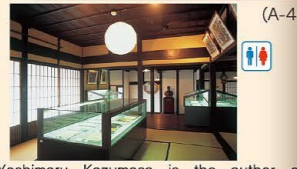
This wooden three-story pagoda was built in 1858 (Ansei 5) by Danna Takahashi, a master craftsman of Usuki.

11 Usuki City Historical Museum (A-3)



Exhibits themed around History and Culture of Prayer from the Jomon to Edo periods. Exhibits on the theme of "The History and Culture of Prayer" are displayed here, covering materials from the Jomon period through the Edo period. The facility also hosts exhibitions related to the city's historical and cultural heritage.

12 Municipally Designated Tangible Cultural Property Former Ina Clan Residence Yoshimaru Kazumasa Memorial Museum "House of Early Spring Song" (A-4)



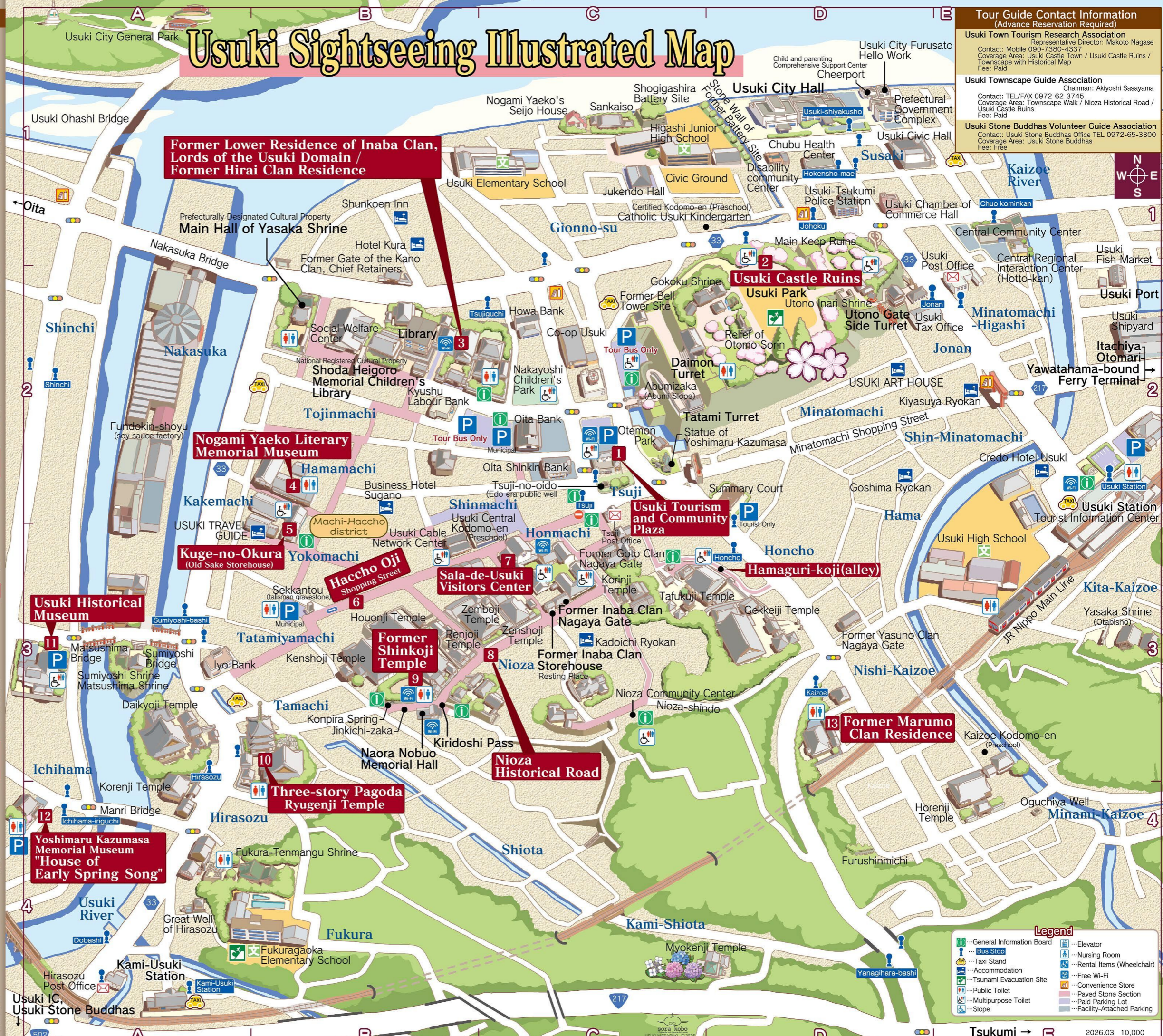
Yoshimaru Kazumasa is the author of "Soshunfu." His wife Yuki's family home has been opened as a memorial museum.

13 Municipally Designated Tangible Cultural Property Former Marumo Clan Residence (D-3)



This residence belonged to a high-ranking samurai of the Usuki domain. The building reflects the formal architectural style of the samurai class, with a strong emphasis on entertaining guests and maintaining social standing.

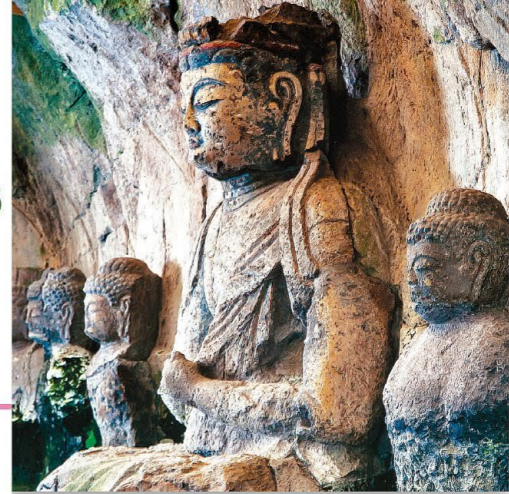

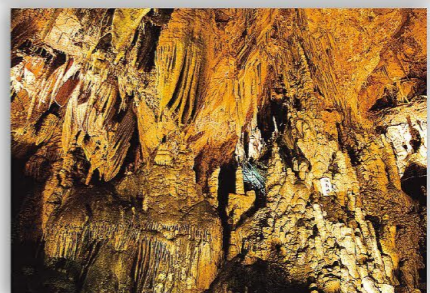

14 National Treasure, Special Historic Site Usuki Stone Buddhas (G-7)

Usuki's cliff-carved Buddhas, believed to be sculpted from the late Heian to Kamakura periods. Over 60 figures were designated as a Special Historic Site in 1952 and Important Cultural Property in 1962. After many years of conservation and restoration work, the Dainichi Nyorai statue—the principal image of the Furuzono Stone Buddhas, long known only by its head—was returned to its original form. In June 1995, a total of 59 statues across the four groups of the Usuki Stone Buddhas were designated as National Treasures. Later, on September 15, 2017, two additional statues—the standing Kongorikishi guardians—were also designated as National Treasures, bringing the total number of National Treasure statues in the Usuki Stone Buddha complex to 61. With wood-like carving precision, quantity, and quality, this is Japan's most distinguished group of cliff-carved Buddhas.



19 Nationally Designated Natural Monument Furen Limestone Cave (G-9)

Discovered in 1926 by local youth in Tomari, this 500m enclosed cave is a rare formation. With minimal outside air, it remains unweathered, emitting a near-pure white sheen. Its largest stalagmite, Kyoshuhou, stands 10m tall and 16m in circumference.



15 Municipally Designated Scenic Spot Hakuba-kei Valley (H-7)

A gorge upstream of the Usuki River, known for its scenic streams and trees, especially in autumn.
